

The Board is responsible for fabricating and updating policies for the Centre, envisioning strategic goals and working towards implementing them, creating fundraising initiatives, raising awareness of our mission and mandate, ensuring services are meeting the needs of the survivors accessing them, and finally acting as an advisory council on matters that include finance, business, and human resources.

What does this entail?

Members will be required to attend and participate in monthly Board meetings, as well as participate in sub-committees and attend agency events. The Board discusses updates to the Centre and analyzes current efforts in comparison to our mission and values to ensure we are abiding by them.

What skills do I need?

Individuals must be committed to the mission of the organization, be dedicated to creating change, and work well as part of a team. Those who wish to be on the Board will have the opportunity to work on projects independently, and therefore, individuals with strong work ethic would succeed in this role.

What skills will I gain?

Prospective Board members will gain experience in creating and implementing policies from a feminist framework, in enhancing their leadership and decision-making skills, and in their understanding of how a Board functions.

What is the time commitment?

As a Director, you will be dedicating 3-6 hours a month to the Centre. The Board hosts monthly meetings from 5p-7:30p at the Centre (400 Elliott Ave, Unit 1) on the third Tuesday of each month. Board members are required to complete 2 full terms at the Sexual Assault Centre Kingston.

What's the application process?

1. Send a letter of intent to volunteer@sackington.com detailing why you would like to be apart of our Board of directors.
2. The Volunteer Coordinator will send you an online application.
3. You will connect with members of the Sexual Assault Centre Kingston for an in-person interview.
4. If successful, you will be invited to a monthly Board Meeting.
5. If successful, you are now a Board Member!
